
Welcome to our first newsletter of 2015. I hope this finds you well, and surviving the cold. For those in the Maritimes, if you jump just high enough you might see

CANADIAN SECTION REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT

Relative to the past few years, TWS Council activities have been fairly subdued since our last meeting at the TWS Annual Conference in Pittsburgh but progress has been made by a few of the committees that I am involved with;

- Last September, the Improvement of Agency Biologist Membership Ad Hoc Committee conducted a survey of state, federal, and provincial agency biologists, AFWA members, and TWS state/provincial chapter members to understand what beliefs or perceptions are inhibiting them from being members at the parent society level and what can be done to increase their participation in the parent society. A non-response bias survey was sent out in November and the results are being compiled for a preliminary report to Council at the mid-year meeting in March.
- The Bylaws and Ethics Subcommittees have been working on a “standalone” TWS Code of Ethics. At present, the TWS Code of Ethics is part of the TWS Bylaws (Article II). Consequently, any change to the Code of Ethics, such as the “Procedure for Addressing Code of Ethics Violations”, requires a vote of the entire membership. To facilitate changes as required, it was recommended by legal counsel and the Committee that the detailed ethics guidelines and process be moved out of the TWS bylaws. Adherence to the Code of Ethics will remain a part of the Bylaws but the details of the General Provisions, Standards for Professional Conduct and Enforcement will be given in a separate document. If approved by Council, all members will be asked to vote on these changes later in the spring or early summer.

- Both Evie Merrill (JWM) and Chris Ribic (WSB) are planning to step down as Editors-in Chief at the end of their current terms in July and December, respectively. The Publications Subcommittee has initiated development of a process for selecting new Editors-in Chief and is seeking input on candidates who would be effective editors and good leaders for the journals. If you would like to make any recommendations, please send them to me as soon as possible – we need to fill these two positions in relatively short succession, and also in the relatively near future.

All of the TWS Subcommittees are currently preparing reports for discussion at the mid-year Council meeting that will be held March 8th and 9th in Omaha, Nebraska, during the North American Wildlife & Natural Resources Conference. If you have any concerns or ideas about how TWS can better serve your needs that I can put forward at the mid-year Council meeting, please let me know.

This week I received the call for applications to the Leadership Institute “Class of 2015”. The goal of the Leadership Institute is to facilitate development of new leaders within TWS and the wildlife profession. Each year, the Leadership Institute recruits 10-15 promising early-career professionals for a series of intensive activities and mentoring relationships. The focus is on exposing the participants to the inner workings of TWS and increasing the number of active leaders in TWS and the wildlife profession. Canadians have been very well represented in the last couple of years with two participants in 2013 (Agnès Pelletier and Jonathan Wiens) and two more in 2014 (Erin McCance and Sonja Leverkus). If you are an early-career professional, 2 to 3 years out of school (either undergraduate or graduate school), and currently working full-time in a wildlife professional position, you should seriously consider this opportunity. You can find out more on the TWS website (<http://wildlife.org/next-generation/leadership-institute/>) or you might want to get in touch with one of the previous participants. The application deadline is **March 27, 2015**.

Time is running out but if you haven't done so already, please consider nominating one of our Canadian colleagues for one of the many annual TWS Awards; Fellows Program, TWS Wildlife Publication Awards, Chapter and Student Chapter of the Year Awards, Student Chapter Advisor of the Year Award, Excellence in Wildlife Education Award and the Group Achievement Award. Nominations for these awards may be submitted to TWS by individual members, Sections, Chapters or Working Groups. Many of the Awards have a **February 15** deadline but several, such as the TWS Distinguished Service Award that is selected by the Canadian Section,

are not due until **March 15**. If you would like to suggest a nominee for any TWS awards, or you would like assistance in preparing a nomination, please contact Canadian Section President Darren Sleep (dsleep@ncasi.org), me, or any member of the Executive as soon as possible for further information. I hope you are making plans to attend our Canadian Section AGM in Saskatoon, 13-15 March 2015, sponsored by the Saskatchewan Chapter. 

Resource Selection Function in R

Statistical methods for the study of habitat selection have evolved rapidly during the past few years. I will review how resource selection functions can be used to characterize habitat selection using telemetry data. This approach will be placed in context of movement modeling using step selection functions, and contrasted with occupancy analysis.



The Wildlife Society Annual Conference in Winnipeg 2015

The Arrangements Committee had a very successful conference call with Ed Thompson and Kerrell McNeal on January 20th. Fund-raising was the main topic. Ed believes that many of the U.S. sponsors for Pittsburgh will be supportive of the Winnipeg conference, most of the funds required will need to be secured in the next 6 months, support in lieu of direct funding will count toward the overall objective of \$150.0 + required. The Manitoba Chapter Executive is planning their third fund raiser before mid-April and are following up with the SK Chapter about their inquiry regarding fund-raising. We were pleased to learn of the approach the Canadian Section has taken toward their support for our fund-raising efforts and to encourage other chapters to help. Basic decisions were taken to have the opening night reception at the Manitoba Museum and the closing

night reception at the Delta Winnipeg with a Manitoba Social theme. It looks like we will be able to offer tours of the state of the art Manitoba Hydro building in downtown Winnipeg. The Sustainability subcommittee has a very strong leader in Christina McDonald of Green Manitoba. Field Trips subcommittee has prepared a good selection of activity to Churchill or the Winnipeg area. The Churchill Northern Studies Centre is ready to receive registration for trips to Churchill just before (students) or just after (professionals) the conference. Very recently, we began exploring how a 3-day course on chemical immobilization, while maybe at arms length to the conference itself, would be offered by the Winnipeg Zoo veterinarian. This would be oriented toward Canadian professionals attending the conference and receiving training during the same trip. APPLY NOW FOR 2015 LEADERSHIP INSTITUTE

The Wildlife Society (TWS) is currently accepting applications for its Leadership Institute. The Institute's goal is to facilitate development of new leaders within TWS and the wildlife profession. The Institute will recruit 10-15 promising early-career professionals for a series of intensive activities and mentoring relationships. The focus will be on exposing the participants to the inner workings of TWS and increasing the number of active leaders in TWS and the wildlife profession.

From May until October, participants will engage in a series of activities to develop and expand their leadership skills. Institute members will attend the TWS Annual Conference in Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada (October 16-21, 2015) and participate in various activities, including mentoring and leadership workshop sessions. The Institute is free, and participants receive free registration and a travel grant for the conference.

Participation in the Institute is geared toward early-career professionals, individuals 2 to 3 years out of school (either undergraduate or graduate school), currently working full-time in a wildlife professional position, and with demonstrated evidence of their leadership potential. Also eligible are more recent graduates who have shown strong evidence of their leadership potential and those who are working while concurrently pursuing a graduate degree. All applicants must be dues-paying members of TWS and a Chapter or Section of TWS. The selection committee will be seeking to create a diverse group with participants of varying gender, ethnic, and regional diversity. Selection will be based upon:

- An excellent academic record
- Demonstrated leadership capability or potential
- Demonstrated level of excellence in current position
- Commitment to and involvement in TWS

Preference will be given to individuals who are certified as Associate Wildlife Biologists® or Certified Wildlife Biologists®, or who have submitted such an application to TWS.

Applicants must submit (in one PDF, excluding online application form and recommendation letters):

- Cover letter with evidence of leadership capacity or potential, such as previous leadership positions held in TWS Chapters or Student Chapters or in other organizations
- Résumé including a list of publications, awards, etc.
- Academic transcript/s
- 2 letters of recommendation from supervisors, academic advisors, professors, or others in leadership positions with whom you have worked and who are familiar with your leadership potential, commitment to TWS, and commitment to wildlife management and conservation

Scholarships and Awards

Albert W. Franzmann And Distinguished Colleagues Memorial Award 2015

Inspired by the passing of our beloved colleague, mentor and friend Al Franzmann in February, 2009, and to honour all of those who have passed on and have contributed to our knowledge and understanding of moose biology and management, Alces has established the "Albert W. Franzmann and Distinguished Colleagues Memorial Award". The one-time award, valued at CDN \$1,500, will be given annually to a graduate student entering or continuing¹ in a Master's or Doctoral program at a recognized university in Canada or the United States. The applicant's research should be directed toward studies of the biology and management of moose within their circumpolar distribution or other ungulates or mammalian carnivores overlapping their range.

Applicants are required to submit: (1) an official (signed and sealed) academic transcript of their complete academic record; (2) an up-to-date curriculum vitae; (3) a detailed description of the research to be undertaken (min. 4 pages, max. 10 pages) as would be

prepared for a thesis advisory committee; and, (4) a short supportive letter from the student's graduate supervisor. Applications must be submitted² by **March 15** of the year in which the award is to be used. A committee of 3 past recipients of the Distinguished Moose Biologist Award will review applications and rank each submission. The recipient will be determined by consensus of the committee and their decision will be binding³. The recipient of the award will be announced at the Annual North American Moose Conference and Workshop⁴.

Recipients must acknowledge receipt of the award in any subsequent publications of their work and are strongly encouraged to publish at least some portion of their research in the journal *Alces* prior to or following completion of their graduate program.

Donations to support the "Albert W. Franzmann and Distinguished Colleagues Memorial Award" should be made payable to Lakehead University Alces Account # 50-1606-2051 can be sent to Dr. Art Rodgers². *Alces* is not a registered charitable organization or incorporated as a not-for-profit corporation and cannot issue receipts for income tax purposes.

¹ **First-time applicants in the early phases of their research will be given preference.** Previous unsuccessful applicants may reapply³. In the absence of suitable new applicants, consideration will be given to previous recipients pending submission of a progress report and recommendation by their graduate supervisor. Previous recipients interested in reapplying should contact Dr. Art Rodgers² after March 15 to find out if the award is still available. The deadline for previous recipients to submit a progress report and letter of recommendation will be April 15 of the year in which the award is to be used.



Arctic Ungulate Research and Management: the Past, the Present and the Future



11th National Wild Turkey Symposium January 2016, Tucson, AZ

The National Wild Turkey Symposium seeks original research and synthesis papers on the ecology and management of wild turkeys for presentation at the Symposium and publication in the Proceedings. The Symposium occurs every 5 years and brings together state, federal and private wild turkey researchers, land managers, and enthusiasts to exchange ideas relative to ensuring sustainability of the wild turkey resource.

Contributed papers will be peer-reviewed. Submissions can include presentation of original results, case studies, and review articles of pertinent topics. The proposed areas of emphasis for the Symposium include: understanding the future of wild turkey habitat; delivery of science to affect policy; science behind hunter recruitment and retention; and maintaining sustainable wild turkey populations.

Process: Authors are asked to submit an abstract by **20 September 2013**. The abstract is limited to 300 words, not including the title, author(s), and author(s) affiliation(s). The abstract must include contact information for the corresponding author. Submit abstracts to: darren.miller@weyerhaeuser.com with “Wild Turkey Symposium abstract” in the email subject line. An Editorial Board will review all submitted abstracts and authors of selected abstracts will be asked to submit a full manuscript for consideration. Authors of accepted manuscripts are expected to present their work at the Symposium in Tucson. The Proceedings will be available at or soon after the Symposium.
